## ABOUT THIS GUIDE

**A**CE has prepared this guide to assist GLBTI people, their friends and family to vote for equality in the 2007 Federal election.

This Senate voting mini-guide is designed to help voters understand how their vote will be distributed if they vote above the line for a particular party in the Senate election.

When you vote by placing a [1]

above the line on a Senate ballot paper, the party you are voting for determines how your vote is distributed.

That's why we're recommending you vote below the line and number every box on the Senate ballot paper.

If you do want to vote above the line, we hope that this guide helps you in voting GLBTI-friendly on 24 November 2007.

## TWO VOTES, TWO ELECTIONS

**T**his Federal election you will be casting two votes in two different elections.

The first election will be for the Senate. The Senate consists of 76 members, consisting of 12 members from each state, and 2 members from each territory

The 2007 Senate election is a half-Senate election. This means the vote being held is to elect 6 Senators in each state, and 2 Senators in each territory.

To be elected, a candidate must poll 1/7th plus one vote in a

state ballot, or 1/3rd plus one vote in a territory ballot.

The second election is to elect the 150 members to the House of Representatives.

Each state and territory is split into geographic electorates. Each electorate's voters elect one House of Representatives member. The elected candidate requires a majority of more than 50% of the votes to be elected.

In both the Senate and House of Representatives elections, votes are cast using a preferential

system of voting.

This means that even if your preferred candidate is not elected, your vote passes to your next preferred candidate.

This occurs for all votes until all Senators and each House of Representatives member is elected.

**D**id you know your vote on November 24 is worth dollars to the political parties — about \$4.20?

Sometimes people feel their vote is worthless at election time, or that casting a vote for a party that is not likely to win is a wasted vote.

But this is far from the truth. Your two votes — for the House of Representatives and for the Senate — are each worth \$2.10 to the candidate you give your

first preference vote.

Candidates receive this electoral funding after the election if they get more than 4% of the first preference votes in an election.

In 2004, this funding earned the major political parties quite substantial amounts.

When you consider your vote, consider which candidates deserves your support — and the election funding that comes from your giving them your vote.

## THE QUESTIONS WE ASKED

The Australian Coalition for Equality asked all the major parties contesting the 2007 federal election for their response to the following issues affecting lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and intersex Australians.

We asked them a series of questions about their attitudes towards areas of concern for

Australia's GLBTI population.

To aid voters, we have compiled a table of the results for the major parties. This table is set

out below on this page.

Where a party has indicated full support, they have received a 'yes'; non-support has received a 'no'. If a party partially supports an issue, or has failed to give details, then they have received a dual-shaded box.

Some parties chose to not to respond, and we have used their previous public statements on GLBTI issues in the results table.

The NSW Senate ballot ballot consists of 25 different groups and 79 candidates.

**We recommend voters considering voting below the line if they wish to vote for any party listed in red. This will allow them to direct their vote away from parties which are against GLBTI equality.**

Fred Nile's Christian Democratic Party was founded in NSW and its strongest support base is in NSW.

**We recommend voters considering voting below the line if they wish to vote for any party listed in red. This will allow them to direct their vote away from parties which are against GLBTI equality.**

During the last Senate election, a good preference flow to Family First resulted in the election of Senator Steve Fielding.

## ANALYSIS:

The Queensland Senate ballot consists of 24 different groups and 65 candidates.

**We recommend voters considering voting below the line if they wish to vote for any party listed in red. This will allow them to direct their vote away from parties which are against GLBTI equality.**

The vote for the Coalition in Qld, supported by parties like One Nation, have resulted in the past in electing four Senators.

Pauline Hanson returns to the Senate race, directly competing against candidates endorsed by One Nation.

**A number of progressive parties have preferenced Group M candidates Eric Wynne and Kevin Fitzgerald after mistakenly assuming these candidates were progressive.**

**Therefore we recommend voters considering voting below the line to direct their vote away from parties which are against GLBTI equality like Group M.**

**We recommend voters considering voting below the line if they wish to vote for any party listed in red. This will allow them to direct their vote away from parties which are against GLBTI equality.**

South Australia is the home to the Family First Party and to No Pokies MP Nick Xenophon. Each of these two candidate groups could feature strongly in the result.

### ANALYSIS:

The Tasmanian Senate ballot consists of 11 different groups and 28 candidates.

**We recommend voters considering voting below the line if they wish to vote for any party listed in red. This will allow them to direct their vote away from parties which are against GLBTI equality.**

The Greens are expected to poll well with Greens Leader Bob Brown seeking re-election.

The Greens in Tasmania have been smeared by the Exclusive Brethren in prior elections, often with secret Brethren campaigning on GLBTI issues.

The Tasmanian Gay and Lesbian Rights Group has been working hard in the state to ensure candidates sign a pledge to not use anti-gay politics in the campaign.

### ANALYSIS:

The ACT Senate ballot consists of 8 different groups and 16 candidates.

The Northern Territory ballot consists of 5 different groups and 11 candidates.

**We recommend voters considering voting below the line if they wish to vote for any party listed in red. This will allow them to direct their vote away from parties which are against GLBTI equality.**

The Greens are tipped to upset the result in the ACT ballot and may win a seat off the Liberal Party, while the NT ballot is expected to be evenly split between Labor and the Country Liberal Party.
